He then brings up Tom Brokhaw's "The Greatest Generation" which talks about how the generation of the WWII was all about others and how the generation afterwards was all about "Me, me, and me".



ADAMS DELIVERS MESSAGE BY: MICHEAL BROWN



The school brings in the harvest festival speakers from Gospel Fellowship, Lustre MB Church, and Lustre EMB following their sermons on the Sunday prior. This week, Dr. Bill Adams, the speaker from the MB addressed the students of LCHS. The worship team kicked off the afternoon with "Prince of Peace" and "Knees to the Earth." After that, Dr. Adams came to speak.

He started by talking about passions. For example, his daughter Ruthie is passionate about helping people trapped in sex slavery. He encouraged the students to be zealous for something, like they are about Case vs. John Deere, for example. Then, Dr. Adams told them about the organization he works with, called Bridges for Peace.

He showed the students two videos, one about the Zealous tour to Israel. The other was about how Israel,

though it is the 152nd smallest country in the world, is often the first country to show up in natural disaster-struck areas. The video used Charlie Puth's song "One Call Away."

The final challenge for the students was to consider how they could support Israel, and to respond if God speaks to them about going to serve on a short term missionary trip, like the one to Israel.



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
