FORGIVING THE TYRANTS BY: ETIEN VAN DE GRUITER

Lustre Christian High School was invited along

with many other schools within the general area Glasgow, Montana to a "lecture" by Eva Mozes Kor on



the 1st of November 2016. Eva is a holocaust survivor along with her twin sister Miriam who passed away June 6, 1993.

Eva wasn't a typical survivor of the holocaust; she survived the Auschwitz death camp along with only 200 other children, most of the children were Mengele twins. On the first day when she was in camp, she made a secret vow to herself that she and Miriam will get out to-

gether, alive. She was driven to stay alive under two

> circum stances; dead on the latrine floor Mengele's

prediction on Eva's illness.

Dr. Mengele was experimenting on twins (like Eva) and Eva knew if she died there, so would Miriam. Thus another silent vow was made; to live and survive. For two weeks she fought the illness with which she'd been infected by Dr. Mengele, and was held for another three weeks for further results.

They were liberated by the Soviet Army on January 27, 1945 and went on to live with her aunt in Romania after being in three different refugee camps over the course of nine months. She went to high school, joined the communist party group and became the president of the group in her high school; However, eventually refused the ideas of the party and resigned. Eva and Miriam moved from Romania to Israel in 1950 where they felt welcomed by the community there. Eva continued her academics in an agricultural school and was later drafted to the Israeli army and became a sergeant major in the engineering corps.


next morning there was a sendoff before the team left for Saco.
