

LIONS PREP FOR BALL SEASON BY: SHELBY REDDIG


Leaves have left. The air is a bit brisker. You know what that means...it's basketball season! The long-awaited No-

sonnel and was not taken to the hospital, Michaelis says that there are no charges pending.

On a more interesting note, Canada has joined the search for invasive mussel species called Zebra and Quagga mussels after Montana had first detected it. Montana is a firewall for these invasive mussels that can damage fisheries, hydro damage, and irrigation damages that are estimated to be around a half-billion dollars if the mussels spread out of Montana. On Wednesday the 23rd of November, Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks officials reported a third possible detection of mussel larva this fall. The new incident was found in the Missouri River south of Townsend near the York's

Island Fishing Access site. Previous detections have been confirmed in the Tiber Reservoir of the Marias River and Canyon Ferry Reservoir on the Missouri. Before Thanksgiving, specially trained dogs were deployed at boatinspection areas to sniff out the unwanted species, in hopes of a better outcome.


