One unique aspect of the Lustre Community is the deep roots of local families. Many of

the folks who live around this area can trace their history on the land back a hundred years or more. Monroe Bartel is

one of these people. He still lives on and farms the land that

his father homesteaded near the turn of the century. The family has a long history that spans an

> ocean, and ultimately led them to become a part of our community.

> The Bartel family originated in the Warsaw area of Poland.

The first members of the family to arrive in America were

John and Agenetha Bartel. They left Poland and arrived at Ellis Island, New York on July 14, 1880, with their three children. They went on to settle in the Hillsboro, Kansas area. Here their children grew and started families. In 1916 two of the boys, John and Cornelius, decided to go homestead in the Montana Territory. They load-

God would help her through the difficulties and temptations.

ed their belongings and families onto trains and headed north. Thev established their homesteads near each other in 1917. Cornelius's family had a house built costing a grand total of seventy-one dollars and seventy-five cents. Here Cornelius and Martha Bartel raised their family. Their youngest boys, twins Monroe and Marvin, took over operations of the farm from their father in the 1940's. They operated the farm jointly until the 1980's when they divided their holdings. Monroe and his wife Wilma raised a family of three children, and today, they still live out on the farm.

When asked what he remembers about grow-

ing up he recalled vividly how he rode a horse to Pioneer school, not far from the homestead. He then went on to high school in Wolf Point. He recalls how they stayed in town during the winter months because of the difficulty of getting back up north in the snow. When asked about major historical events that occurred in his lifetime, he said he remembers the depression years, but they didn't seem that bad, because money had always been tight. He recalls when WWII came around. He recalls word of the Pearl Harbor attacks coming over the radio. He was too young to be drafted at first. Eventually he was called up, but he was given a deferment be-

cause he worked in agriculture. After his year was up, he was on his way to his physical in Great Falls when word came through of the atomic bombing and the war's end.

The Bartel name is one that has been a part of the community for a long time. As the centennial of the first homesteads Lustre approaches and we take a look back

after high school that they married and had four children. When the children were high school age, their friends were welcomed into the home. Now, Bill and Eunice have been married for 57 years and have known each other for 63 years.

Eunice has had several occupations. Wife and mother top the list, but she also worked at Lustre Grade School as the cook of 75 people for 8 years. The children at the school developed really good relationships with her. She has taught

quilting classes, too.

The hardest time for her was when her oldest son had a car accident and was severely injured. While he was recovering, Thanksgiving came along. She was very thankful her son made it through, although his injury was really bad.

Another challenge for her was learning she had cancer in 2001. She felt really fortunate her doctor guided her one step at a time, and she got really nice Christian nurses. She also started to make quilts for cancer patients. The quilts were given away even if no one was thankful, because she didn't do it for herself, but for the glory of the Lord.

Later on, she made quilts regularly, four every 2 weeks, to raise money for charity. It's been 30 years since she began doing it.

Ending the chapel, Pastor John read an article which compares life as a quilt, made of pieces of fabrics, not completed, and sometimes with holes. However, the more holes it has, the more the light of Christ will shine through it.
