On Monday, October 2nd, Lustre Christian High School welcomed guest speaker Dr. Randy White. Who came to us from Taos New Mexico.

The chapel service started out as usual with singing led by the high school worship team. After singing, Pastor Frank stepped up to the front of the room and introduced the students to Dr. White.

After the introductions were concluded, Dr. White introduced himself, and like the many others who have visited Lustre, commented on how

special the area is. He then encouraged the high school students to come and listen to his sermons that he would be giving for the Lustre MB's harvest festival on Monday and Tuesday night.

He started the chapel by telling the students that the Bible was like any other book or play; it is about something and it has a plot. He stated that the Bible is about Gods plan for our redemption. He took the students through the Bible starting in Genesis 3, where, after eating the fruit,

Eve was told by God that the serpent would crush her offspring's heel, but that her offspring (Jesus) would crush the serpent's head.

After looking at the beginning of the story in Genesis, Dr. White directed the students to Revelation, where the plot of the Bible comes to fruition. Secondly, we ought to pray that His will be done in everything, whether big or small. Lastly, we need to accept whatever happens without frustration, anxiety, or regret. Pastor Kelly closed by saying that God is always listening to you, so keep talking!


