ADVENT - THE SPIRIRT OF CHRISTMAS BY: HARRY AN LE

Advent is the season four weeks before Christmas in which we prepare for the coming of Christ. It begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, which is the Sunday

nearest to November 30th, and ends on Christmas Eve (December 24th). If Christmas Eve is a Sunday, it is counted as the fourth Sunday of Advent,

with Christmas Eve proper beginning at sundown. Advent is the period of preparation for the celebration of the birth of

Jesus and its name comes from the Latin word "adventus", which means "coming".

Advent is marked by a spirit of expectation, of anticipation, of

preparation, of longing. There is a yearning for deliverance from the evils of the world, first expressed by Israelite slaves in Egypt as they cried

out from their bitter oppression. It is the cry of those who have experienced the tyranny of injustice in a world under

the curse of sin, and yet who have hope of deliverance by a God who has heard the cries of oppressed slaves and brought deliverance.

Advent is a time of preparation that is marked by prayer. While Lent is characterized by fasting and a spirit of penitence, Advent's prayers are prayers of humble devotion and commitment, prayers of submission, prayers for deliverance, prayers from those walking in darkness that are awaiting and anticipating a

great light.

The beginning of Advent is a time for the hanging of the green, decoration of the church with evergreen wreaths, boughs, or trees that help to symbolize the new and everlasting life brought through Jesus the Christ. The circle of the wreath reminds us of God Himself, His eternity and endless mercy, which has no beginning or end. The green of the wreath speaks of the hope that we have in God, the hope of

newness, of renewal, of eternal life. Candles symbolize the light of God coming into the world through the birth of His son. The four outer candles represent the period of waiting during the four Sundays of Advent, which themselves symbolize the four centuries of waiting between the prophet Malachi and the birth of Christ. The light of the candles reminds us that Jesus is the light of the world that comes into the darkness of our lives to bring newness, life, and hope. It also reminds us that we are called to be a light to the world as we

reflect the light of God's grace to others.

We celebrate with gladness the great promise in the Advent, yet knowing that there is also a somber tone as the theme of threat is added to the theme of promise. This is reflected in some of the Scripture readings for Advent, in which there is a strong prophetic tone of accountability and judgment on sin. But this is also faithful to the role of the Coming King who comes to rule, save, and judge the world.



MIKE HAMMERLY SPEAKS IN CHAPEL BY LEVI BROWN

On Thurs. Nov. 16th, Mike Hammerly from the Assembly of God in Scobey spoke in chapel. He



spoke on a passage of scripture from 2nd Kings 2:13 till the end of the chapter. He talked about the Mantel of Prayer. He made a point that God uses people of prayer to spread the gospel to others and to change the world. Mike Hammerly said that prayer is powerful and isn't optional for us believers. We

need to be in prayer continually and without ceasing. God can use anyone of us and we need to be prepared. Prayer is a major part of our lives. Prayer is a special time of communication between you and God and this can be done at any time during the day, he's always listening. You can tell him anything and

talk to him about anything, and you shouldn't be scared to because he knows everything, so there is nothing to hide. Mike's main point was that we need to be in prayer so God can work through us to spread the Gospel and so we can further our relationship with Him.

JADE STACY SHARES TESTIMONY BY: THOMAS BROWN

Growing up with a mom addicted to heroin, and being sent to jail at age 13; these were just some of the events that happened in the life of Jade Stacy. After being born in prison, she grew up in south central Los Angeles and lived with various family members. When she was 11, she moved in with her mom, who had just been released from prison. Her mom got right back into doing drugs, and even used Jade in the transfer of drugs, as she was a young kid, and would not be suspected by the police. Some-

times, her mom would be gone for days, leaving Jade to fend for herself; usually, she would go to the church for food.

In November 1987, around the time that she turned 13, she and a group of friends took a stolen car to their school. After her friends went inside, she took the stolen car, ran from the police, and killed a teacher at a crosswalk. At the time, she was too high to realize that she had hit anybody. So, as a 13 year old, she found herself incarcerated for the next 5 years of her life. At age 18, she was granted

an early release and was on probation until 25.

In her last year in prison, the family of the victim contacted her, forgiving her, and telling her about Jesus. At this point, Jade started to wonder about things. Was she worth love? Was her life worth anything? She started to acknowledge that God must exist; however, God must be for good people, she thought. Then, she started to pray. Gradually, she felt peace, as some things started to make sense. She started to attend church, and to

read the Bible. She realized how that teacher's family had been able to forgive and love her; they had clung to the light! Her family turned away from her, calling her a "Jesus Freak." Despite of this, she pressed on, continuing to read, and asking God to rescue her. Some significant verses that she shared included: Psalm 18: 16. 19: 2 Samuel 22:17: Acts 26:18: Acts 2:28: Psalm 51:10: and Ezekiel 36:26. She closed by saying that, "God will give you a new heart," and that, "He loves you and wants to have a relationship with you."




