Olfert Family Arrives in Lustre

We continue our Centennial Celebration interviews with Elvin Olfert. He is the son of Dietrich Mason Olfert who had come to Lustre in 1916. While he was born at his home in Lustre on April 30, 1923, his family came to Montana through difficult circumstances.

Elvin's great grandfather was killed at age 28 for his faith. His great grandmother remarried and came to America (1878) 10 years later with Elvin's grandfather

who was age 14. They came from Russia after moving from country to country, always seeking for religious freedom. Elvin's great grandparents decided that his family should move after loss of freedom to worship in Russia became unbearable. It took Elvin's family about three weeks to travel from Russia to Lustre.

Growing up, Elvin went to school across from the MB church, then called



the Fairview school; two years (winters) at Lustre Bible School, either on horseback or walking; and also went to Glasgow high school for 1-1/2 years.

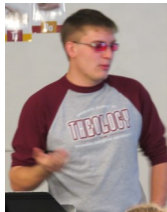
His activities included playing softball on Sunday afternoons, riding horse, playing fox and geese, and pump pull away. He also saw farmers helping each other when needed and trading help back and forth. Sometimes people

even paid \$50 per day for the help they received!

Back then, This place looked like nothing – well, tall grass and the occasional visiting Native Americans. Section – stake markers were the only additions to the landscape.

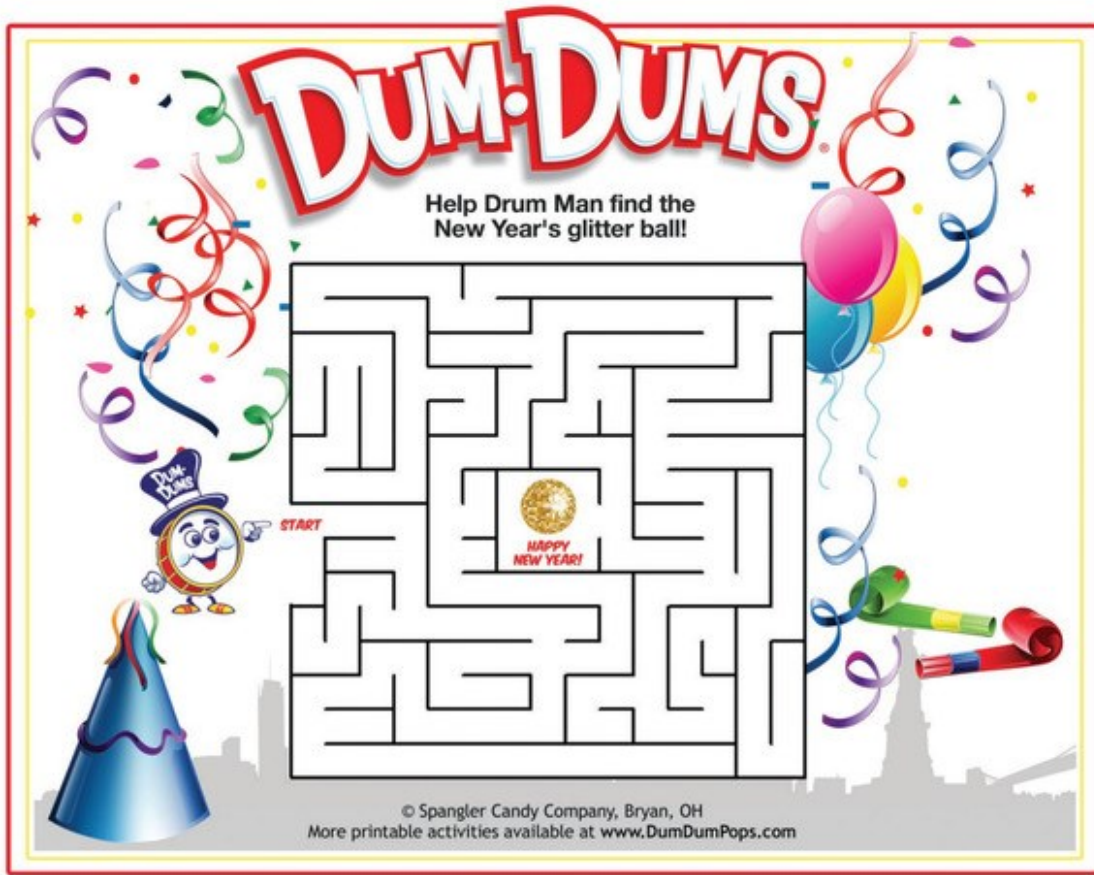
Horses, wagons, or sleighs were used, if roads were muddy or snow - covered. At first, because of the poor con-

ditions, the cars were only used when roads were dry. Eventually, cars were driven only for long trips. The first trip he remembers while riding in a car was to Minnesota. The car was filled with gas east of Culbertson at the glass topped pumps.

When asked about historical events he remembers, Elvin said he was not accepted to the military because he had a broken leg. He does,

however, remember his buddies leaving for war, three of whom never returned.

Illnesses were treated mainly by trying to increase the body temperature to sweat off the sickness and also made tents of high humidity. Even so, many had a bottle of brandy or whiskey in the pantry as a cure. As you can see, stuff has changed a lot over the years.
