He talked for a while about the school, and then had the students open up their Bibles as he began. The first passage that we went to was James 1:22-24, which says, "But be doers of the word, and

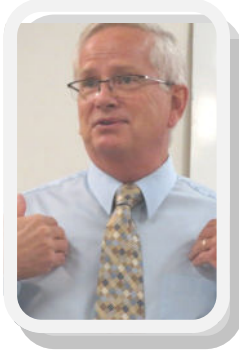
not hearers only, deceiving yourselves. For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man observing his natural face in a mirror; for he observes himself, goes away, and immediately forgets what kind of man he was."

Mr. Miles went on to say that the Bible is a mirror, showing us who we really are. Any - body can just look into a mirror, but James implores you to not just see, but to also act upon what you have seen. If we look into God's Word, and even feel convicted, but do nothing about it, then it is

meaningless. The result of it being mere knowledge and not acted on is this: an apathetic Christian. As Believers, we ought to study the Bible, apply it to our life, and act on it.

Mr. Miles closed with these final three things:

- First, set a Bible-reading goal for the school year.
- Secondly, ask God to really help you to live out everything that you are learning.
- And finally, we need to look intently into the things that we are studying, and ask, "God, what are you saying to me?"

A GIFT AND A CURSE BY: KAITLYN TOAVS

Many people merely accept Daylight Savings Time (DST) as the reason we grudgingly wake up an hour earlier in March and gratefully sleep in an extra hour in October. What people don't stop and consider is the reasoning behind it. DST is a seasonal time change measure where clocks are set back or ahead of normal time twice a year to make better use of daylight and conserve energy. Today, about 40% of countries worldwide use this energy conservation method, but who came up with this idea in the first place?

A common misconception

is that Benjamin Franklin is the Father of Daylight Savings Time. However, the idea he presented didn't even involve turning the clocks. In a letter to the editor of the Journal of Paris, Franklin merely suggested that Parisians could economize candle usage but waking up an hour earlier. What's more: Franklin intended it to be a joke. British builder William Willett is the guy to thank for Daylight Savings. In 1905, Willett suggested setting the clocks 20 minutes ahead on each Sunday in April and then switching it back on the four Sundays in September. It was Willett's proposal that eventu-

ally gained traction in the British House of Commons and was later implemented in the United Kingdom. The first place to actually implement DST was not the United Kingdom but actually a small group of Canadians in Ontario. However, the idea did not catch on globally until Germany used it in 1916 during WWI to minimize the use of artificial lighting in order to save fuel for the war effort.

Although modern DST has been in use for only around 100 years, ancient civilizations are known to have done similar changes. For example, the Ro-

man water clocks used different scales for different months of the year to adjust the daily schedules to the solar time.

People tend to have a love-hate relationship with Daylight Savings Time, but rarely do we take time to ponder the reasons it's in place. It may interrupt our sleeping schedule, but it has been an effective way to conserve energy for many years.

Darwin shared that he had experienced a two-month mission trip to Mali, West Africa before God called him to Japan.

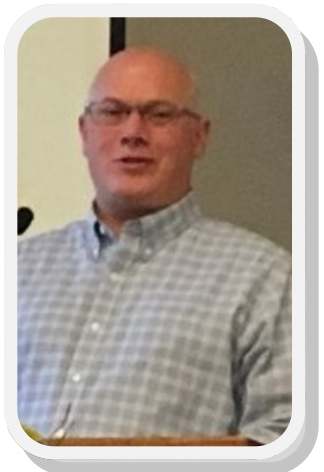

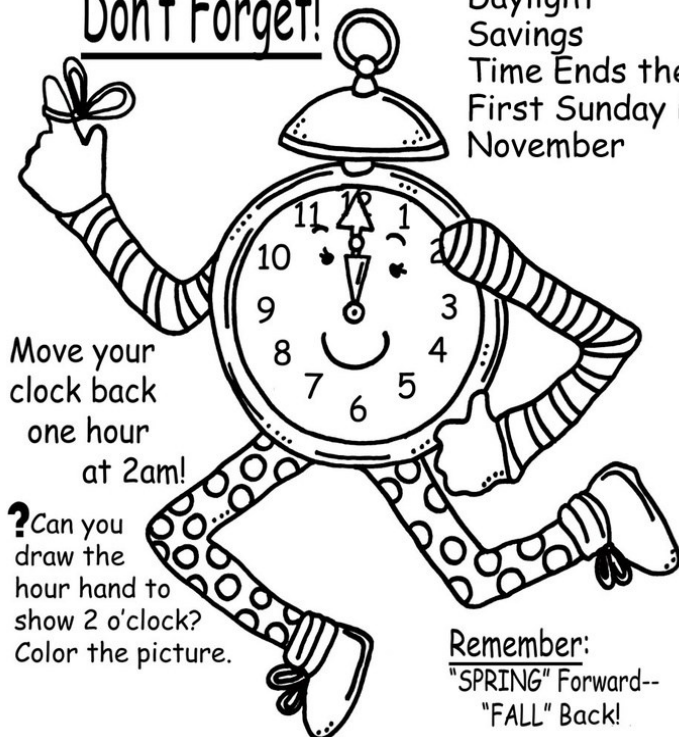
