On Thursday, October twenty sixth, the high schoolers at Lustre Christian high, gathered for their weekly chapel service. Music as usual was led by Mr. Marasco and the high school worship team. After singing a few songs, the worship team was seated, and Pastor John Skillman stepped up to the podium. After praying, he invited Sarah Brown up to the podium. Pastor John started out by asking Sarah a series of questions concerning her family, her spiritual life, and her husband Darin. She then directed the student's attention to a slideshow that

contained photos of friends, family, and other people important in her life, including her children (Michael, Zach, Josh, Grace and Hannah) and her husband Darin. As the students observed the slideshow, Sarah narrated and shared about the pictures and the people in them. She began by sharing about her childhood and her early Christian life, and her family's move to Bozeman. After telling the story of how she met Christ, and the impact that her local youth group had on her, she moved on to her life as a young adult. She then shared about the first

time that she met her husband Darin, when her brother invited him to her family's house for the holidays during his time at MSU. After sharing about her life's story, she started to tell about the times leading up to, and directly after Darin's death. Sarah explained that these times were very difficult for her family, but that God through His word and other people, had helped her through it. She explained that God had helped her deal with loss after the death of her husband.

Veterans Day is dedicated to all American veterans, past and present, to thank them for their selfless service to their country. It is often confused with Memorial Day which is the day for honoring America's war dead, for all American military personnel who lost their lives in battle or as a result of wounds sustained during combat. Veterans Day is especially dedicated to all the living soldiers

who honorably served in the armed forces at any time the country needed their services, both in war-time and peacetime.

Veterans Day was known as "Armistice Day" and was first celebrated to mark the end of World War I in 1918, which officially ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, i.e., November 11th. It became a legal federal holiday in 1938 in the aftermath of

the Korean War and World War II.

Veterans Day is celebrated in different countries as well, where they honor soldiers of their respective countries. In Canada, they observe Remembrance Day on Nov. 11 where they honor every veteran who died in the line of duty. It is also known as "Poppy Day" as people wear a red poppy flower to honor their war

WALKING IN HIS DUST BY: KAITLYN TOAVS

On October 18th I was stepping onto Israeli soil for the first time in my life, and I was so... exhausted from the flight that I didn't register this fact. However, after a good night's rest, my excitement over being in the Holy Land was unparalleled. One of the first stories our tour guide told us can originally be found in the Mishnah. The verses tell of how disciples should be eager to learn from their rabbi by following him everywhere he went. It was said that the disciples should walk so closely behind the rabbi that by the end of the day, they would be covered in dust from the rabbi's feet. This illustration stuck with me and painted the way that I viewed the land that I was touring.

Several of the places we visited clearly left an imprint on my mind. The first was Capernaum which was a city situated on the north side of the

Sea of Galilee. Here we got to stand in the remains of the very synagogue where Jesus cast a demon out of a man. After this he left the temple and went to the house of Peter's mother, who also lived in Capernaum. Here Jesus healed Peter's mother, who has very sick with a high fever. These stories are recorded in Mark 1:21-34.

On that same day we also visited Caesarea Philippi, which is a town 30 miles north of the Sea of Galilee and is situated at the bottom of Mount Hermon. This place is mentioned only twice in the Bible but it is important for one main reason: it was in Caesarea Philippi that Jesus first revealed to His disciples that He was indeed the Messiah (Matthew 16:14-18). Though these places were amazing to see, my all-time favorite memory of my trip to Israel was getting to swim in the Sea of

Galilee. As we waded in the warm water, allowing the waves to wash over us, it was almost surreal to think that Jesus had walked on those very waters over 2000 years ago (Matthew 14:22-33). And in that moment I felt closer to my Savior than ever before.

I wouldn't describe my time in Israel as merely a tour. Rather, I'd describe it as a treasure quest of sorts. Throughout our two weeks we visited the sites, learned the stories, and followed the clues, and when we reached the end, what was the treasure, you ask? The Treasure was Christ. I got to see firsthand the land and people that Jesus loves so dearly, and as a result I have come to love them as well. Because of this trip, I have a deeper appreciation not only for Israel, but also for the devotion it takes to "walk in His dust" every day.

"Shalom, Shalom! Boker Tov! My name is Ronen and I'm gonna be your tour guide today! Today, we have the best bus driver in all of Israel, his name is Meir!" This was the greeting our Israeli tour guide gave us every morning once we all were safely on the "promised land" (the tour bus). This is but one of the many memories which I will be remembering from my amazing trip to Israel.

Arriving in Tel Aviv, we waded in the Mediterranean, and set out to the north towards the Sea of Galilee. On the way, we visited some notable sites, including Mt. Carmel which overlooks the valley of Jezreel. Also, we visited the Harod Spring, where Gideon tested his soldiers before battle with the Midonites. We then arrived at the Sea of Galilee, where we were to spend the next several nights.

Capernaum was a very interesting place. A place mentioned all throughout the Gospels, Jesus spent a good bit of time there, doing many things. While driving alongside Israel's border, we could see the stark contrast between countries. You could see the borders by the "green line," as Israel has plant-

ed trees everywhere, right up to their border.

Up to the Golan Heights we went, seeing across the border into Syria. While an expert explained the battles that had happened there, we could hear the artillery from the Syrian civil war right next door. On return to the Sea of Galilee, we saw that the wind had picked up during the day, and that there were some pretty big waves. Seeing the Sea go from perfectly calm to tossing and turning with just a little wind, it became easy to imagine how a storm could have easily blown up on Jesus and His disciples. We then traveled south towards the Dead Sea, along the border with Jordan. We got to see the "mighty Jordan River," which was never more than 10-20 feet wide at the most (that I saw).

Morning came, and with it came the heat. We were going to Masada, and I was one of the many who had decided to hike up the Snake Path. This was no pleasure hike, as it was steeply uphill, and took at least 30 minutes with the temperature in the mid to high 90s. However, it was a lot of fun, and well worth the effort.

Up to Jerusalem! As we left the Dead Sea, we started to climb in elevation, proceeding to Jerusalem. We stopped off at the Old City of King David, and then proceeded into the heart of Jerusalem, eventually arriving at the Western Wall. Hearing about it is one thing, but to actually be there was a privilege, and the memory will not soon be forgotten. We walked about a bit more, and closed the day by arriving at the Dan hotel.

Throughout the tour, we stopped at numerous battle sites and listened as our guide explained how Israel had won all of the wars since their independence in 1948. Each story was a David-Goliath story, with the Jews always being outnumbered, both in men and in weapons. Yet, this tiny country of the Jews, God's chosen people, continues to hold their own in the highly volatile Middle East.

We also traveled to the Bridges for Peace Jerusalem warehouse, where they gave a presentation explaining their ministry to the Jews. Then, arriving at Caliber 3, we were allowed to witness live-fire demonstrations by an anti-terrorist team, as well as fire some weap-

ons ourselves. That day closed at Yad Vashem, a Holocaust memorial, where we walked through, seeing the pictures, and watching short movies where survivors gave their stories.

Our last day in Israel! Time seemed to have flown by, and I couldn't believe that it was already almost over. We went to see the Israeli government buildings, including the Knesset, and then went to the Israel museum, where they have a model of Jerusalem in the first century AD. Also at that site were the Dead Sea Scrolls, ancient writings including parts of the Old Testament, and other artifacts. To close out the day, we once more went into the heart of Jerusalem, walking through the Muslim quarter, the Jewish quarter, and the Christian quarter. That night, there was a farewell dinner, and our group parted ways to return to America. It had been an incredibly fun tour, and I hope that I get another opportunity sometime in my life to return to the promised land.

The sophomores were grateful for a lot of these things too. Amber said she was thankful for family, friends, Lily, Kassie




