Have you ever met a person who escaped from a communist country? On October 22, 2015, LCHS students met Mr. Karl Waitschies in chapel. He talked about his life and how played a part in it.



In World War II, he was born in Germany near Lithuania and Russia. Karl's father left his family to serve in the military, so he lived with his mother and grandparents. One day, the family's house was destroyed because of a bomb, except the piano. As a result, Mr. Waitschies and his family left there and

took the last train to move. He arrived in East Germany through Lithuania. In that time, East Germany was under Russian Rule and was a communist country. The people were very poor. The Russians didn't want people to escape or run away whenever they wanted, so they made a wall between West Germany and East Germany. He couldn't get enough food and medicine because they were surrounded by Russian soldiers and were refugees.

After completing first grade in Germany, his

father didn't come back. So his uncle and aunt who lived in the US wanted to adopt him. Therefore, Mr. Waitschies tried to escape East Germany. As they were fleeing, the Russian soldiers came but they didn't find him. He ran across a minefield to West Germany, and wasn't blown up. His aunt and uncle were waiting for him in West Germany, where they adopted him.

When he lived in a communist country, where church wasn't accepted, he didn't know about God; after coming to the US, Mr. Waitschies learned about God and came to believe in Him.

citizens have protected the U.S. in war. In 1954, President Eisenhower made honoring


these veterans of war a national holiday. Veteran's Day is celebrated all over the United


