Harry - An Le




- Senior (age 16)

School, Pittsburgh, PA last year. He was also a swimmer and a runner for the Penn Hills Indians Team.


- Harry expects to make more friends, have great experiences with friends and community. He hopes he can leave some good memories with people of Lustre.
