OVERSEAS MISSIONARIES INSPIRE IN CHAPEL BY: KAITLYN TOAVS

On September 18, the students and staff of LCHS gathered in the assembly room for their weekly dose of worship and encouragement. This week was special though, because we were honored to have Dave and Suzy (names changed to protect identity) in the house. These two overseas missionaries have been supported by MB missions for many years. They were excited to be back in the area and had a challenging message for all of us from 2 Kings 18.

This story is centered on Hezekiah in the middle of his reign as king of Judah. Now Hezekiah was a godly king who sought to honor the Lord in everything he did. His faith was put to the test though, when Sennacherib, king of Assyria, conquered all of the major cities surrounding Hezekiah's kingdom. With Sennacherib's army closing in, Hezekiah was forced to empty the temple and palace treasury in order to pay his tribute to the king. Though all of the gold and silver had been given to the greedy invader, it still wasn't enough so Hezekiah cried out to God pleading for guidance. His faith in God ended up saving his people from destruction.

Dave used this story to show how crucial it is to listen to God's instruction. He applied this to his own life by telling of his time in the military. When his years of service were completed he got his masters in music and had the opportunity to a professional opera singer. Before he could embark on that journey, though, he received a letter of mandatory deployment to Afghanistan. It was during his time back in




Now, according to her "confession", she is so excited to meet the new science teacher.




