As November progresses, one important holiday coming up is Veterans' Day. This is observed to honor those who have served or are serving our country. Since it is a public holiday, most schools and businesses are closed and the general population gets the day off. Many people observe a moment of silence at 11 a.m.

Other countries celebrate November 11 under other names. Belgium, France, and the UK

observe Remembrance Day. Poland celebrates it as National Independence Day, since they regained their sovereignty after 123 years of partition and rule by Russia, Prussia, and Austria. Germany honors their veterans and those who died under violent oppression on Volkstrauertag, or the National Day of Mourning, two Sundays before the first day of Advent. Interestingly, the Nazis used it to glorify their "heroes", but the

date was moved to the second Sunday after world War II to cement the break with fascism.

The celebratory date of November 11th comes from the end of World War 1, when hostilities were ended on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. Armistice Day was first observed in the United States in 1926 and as a national holiday in 1938. The name was changed to Veterans' Day in 1954.


successful harvest. Those involved in the celebration feasted on corn grown by the colonists and various animals provided both by colonists and Indians. The first thanksgiving


