The Wooden Effect by Zach Brown

On the last day of February, the LCHS students gathered for another chapel in the afternoon. The arranged speaker was Pastor Bruce Inion from Circle Evangelical Church, but he had car trouble in the cold and wasn't able to make it.

Instead, Pastor John showed a movie on the life of the famous basketball coach John Wooden. In a way it was more of a life movie that showed from his child-

hood all the way to the legacy that he left. He grew up on the farm in Indiana where the people farmed in the summer and played basketball in the winter. He became a very good basketball player that went to play for Purdue and was named All-American three times. After college he got married and went on to coach at the high school level. His team was not amazing the first few years however, not winning a

single game. He was drafted into the Navy in 1942 and served for two years earning the title of Lieutenant. When peace was made, he went back to his hometown school to teach and coach but didn't feel like he was in the right place. A short time after, he was asked to coach for UCLA as head coach, where his family moved. There, he remained a pillar in the community and with his players as he served the Lord coaching

for 27 years. He set the record for winning 10 national championships in 12 years and being the first All-American for both coach and player.

The movie also had interviews with former players who told of his incredible faith, humbleness and love for his family and team. John Wooden was one of the most respected people in the history of basketball and stayed close to the Lord all throughout.

Every year the students of Lustre Christian High School, and surrounding schools, have the opportunity to participate in the "Research and Explore Awesome Careers in Healthcare" (R.E.A.C.H) program. This is a one-day event that allows for students to gain hands-on experience in various health care professions. Each group of students consists of whomever chooses to attend from that school. Every group has a day to work alongside medical professionals. R.E.A.C.H usually con-

sists of 7-8 observational and learning stations. Every station lasts around half an hour and consists of instruction and skill building with a professional.
