Some Scripture that relates to this subject is 2 Timothy 1:7, Philippians 4:6-7, and 1 John 4:18-19. Fear can give us an opportunity to be courageous. The last question was "How do you share your testimony?" The answer is to first recognize that you DO have a testimony and that God is working in your life all the time. Take the time to write out your story and ask for help if you need it or are unsure.

Having questions does not mean you lack faith, so ask as many guestions as you need.

### "Saint" Patrick ???

St. Patrick's Day is a celebration of the Patron Saint Patrick of Britain who travelled and ministered to the people

### **Showing God's Love in the Medical Field**

To start off our Spiritual Emphasis at LCHS on March 9<sup>th</sup>, we had the pleasure of listening to Denae Koffman. She is from Glasgow, but she has done medical work in Israel. She began by telling us her story and how she ended up all the way in Israel. She said Israel was always at the top of her list, and she had a strong desire to go. After she lost a lady dear to her and who she had taken care of, Denae needed something to pick God herself up. then showed her she should go, so she began looking into this idea of going to Israel more. Once she got past doors closing, a door opened, finally! She found the opportunity and place God had planned for her.

The place was called Shevet. Shevet is a non-profit organization that brings children in from the Middle East. Most of these children have heart problems. Many of the families who come to seek medical help are Muslim. Israeli doctors donate a lot of their time, and these children can get medical help for so much less of a cost. Denae was with the patients / children the whole time basically, until it's time for them to go home. To give us more of an idea of what Shevet is like, she told us what a typical day is like. They start off with worship and devotions. They try to give you jobs that you'll enjoy ... you go through what your strengths are, and they try to match you with a

job accordingly. They all work together for God. You're assigned a rotating shift. For family care there is a wide age range. There is a nursing staff, which Denae got to be a part of. There are also other jobs like cleaning, laundry, and cooking. Some highlights of her time there were the Jerusalem March, which is a parade of all nations, and her "mountaintop moment" was the Mount of Olives. She talked about the houses of prayer along the way, and how she prayed with people from so many different countries. She said they could've prayed forever. She told us about some of her patients they had, and the love she has for them. Some of the surgeries go well and the kids are healed. By: Amber Reddig

but some don't end up how they hope they would... with surgeries there is always a risk, and sometimes the child's situation is something different than what they thought it was, or even worse. It was inspiring to hear how she's helped these children, and the connections she made to their families and how she still keeps in touch with some. This organization is a way for people to see God's love, and it's amazing how God has a overall plan for everyone /everything. She said that Shevet is God ordained, and He is there with them making the appointments and schedules work. In summary, a quote from Denae was, "God is always good."


