He used Matthew 22: 15-40 to emphasize this. In these verses, the Pharisees are laving plans to trap Jesus. Their first attempt is to make Jesus slip up by asking him the impossible question of whether or not it is right to pay the imperial tax to Caesar. This gues-

tion seemed to only have two answers, both of



which would have upset either the Jews or the Romans. Instead, Jesus steps back and chooses a third answer. Jesus says to give what is God's to God and what is Caesar's to Caesar.

The second attempt to trap Jesus came from the Sadducees. They asked Jesus a paradoxical question about a who married woman multiple times. Thev asked who she would be married to in the afterlife. Jesus again took a step back and gave an answer to a question he was not presented with.

He said that the Sadducees misunderstood the Scripture and how marriage would work in the afterlife.

Finally, on their third attempt, the Pharisees got together and asked Jesus the difficult question, "What is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus gave the answer, "Love the Lord with all your heart, soul, and mind. And the second is like it, love your neighbor as yourself."
