Lions Finish Off Regular Season, Taking Second at District 3C Tournament

On the 11th and 12th of February, the Lustre Lions had their last two games of the regular season, one away in Hinsdale facing North Country and the other at home against the Dodson Coyotes. These wins cemented the Lions as the #1 seed in the 3C District, and the #3 ranked Class-C team in the state.

With district and divisional tournaments coming up, it was important for the Lions to maintain their winning streak. In Hinsdale, the Lions had a

rather slow first half, but emerged victorious with a final score of 69-32. The next game the Lions played was at home against the Dodson Coyotes on February 12th. After the Senior Night ceremonies wrapped up,

the game got under way. The Lions started slow, with only a lead of 7 at the end of the first quarter. The Lions outscored the Coyotes by 8 points in the second quarter to finish the half at 36-21. With 11 more points in the third and 13 more in the fourth, the Lions finished victorious with a final score of 60-43. Kolden Hoversland led in scoring with 27 points, followed by Elijah Lenihan with 16. Jasiah Hambira scored 11 points. Kaleb Hoversland, Cayden Klatt,

and Braden Ewing altogether chipped in for 6 points. Although the Lions didn't finish with a desired blowout, they successfully finished with an undefeated season coming into the District Tournaments! Great job boys!

After finishing the season with a clean record of 17-0, the Lions entered the District 3C Tournament with high hopes of continuing the season in the Divisional tournaments in Sidney. In a game

Beijing Winter Olympics By Rebekah Jossart

It's been an exciting time in 2022 ever since the winter Olympics began February 4th. The Olympic games are a way of bringing the countries of the world together. These games were a long-lost tradition that originated in Ancient Greece and were reestablished in Athens 1,500 years after being banned by Roman Emperor Theodosius I.

The first modern Winter Olympics were held in Chamonix, France, in 1924, with about 250 athletes, representing 16 countries, competing in

16 events. It has grown into an international multi-sport competition that occurs every four years. In today's Winter Olympic Games, there are 15 different sports to choose from.

This year's Olympics were held in Beijing, China.

The Olympic torch was carried through the Beijing National Stadium on Friday during the Opening Ceremony by



six different Chinese athletes born in each generation since the 1950s. The torch was then placed in a giant snowflake composed of smaller snowflakes bearing the names of every participating country.

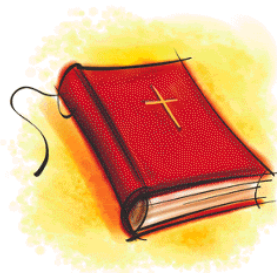
Eighty-four countries were represented in this year's Olympics. Norway was the country that earned the most medals in the

competition with 37 overall. With 32 medals, the Russian Olympic Committee finished second. Germany came in third place with 27 medals. Canada came in fourth with 26 medals, followed by the United States with 25 medals. This year's winter Olympics has been an exciting time to watch all of the participating countries work their hardest! There's no doubt that the next Olympics, held in the summer of 2024, will be just as exciting.

SCHMECKFEST WILL BE MARCH 25TH AT LUSTRE CHRISTIAN HIGH SCHOOL.

These instructions are in the blue booklet. . .

~Due to the chance of food-borne illnesses, the county sanitarian recommends that whenever possible, prepare food in church or school kitchens. **Wash your hands** frequently with soap and hot water while preparing food. Home canned green beans are not allowed for green bean soup.

~Please bring your **soup** in a crock pot. Do not bring soup in glass jars. Chicken noodle soup should have ¼ inch noodles (Kluski brand from Reynold's is pretty close to homemade!)

~Please see your Schmeckfest recipe book for instructions on cooking **verenika**.

~**Sauerkraut** should be in a roaster. Do NOT use aluminum foil. Three #10 cans are needed per recipe. This will be purchased and available at LCHS on March 15th .

~Foam trays and plastic bags are available at the churches or by request. Use the trays particularly for the more fragile **perishke** and frozen **verenika**. If you bake more than one day in advance, please freeze immediately and thaw baked goods before re-packaging in plastic.

~Package by the dozen: **zwiebach**, **rull kuchen**, **perishke**, and **New Year's cookies** (no sugar on these). **Peppernuts** are to be packaged in four-cup amounts.

Food Tips:

- ♦ Please wrap hot foods in newspapers, then wrapped in blankets or towels, etc
- ♦ **Label** on the outside what food it is and the amount.
- ♦ Please **label all** your containers (crock pots, roasters (especially lids & liners too), blankets, towels, etc.) in order to find your items after Schmeckfest.
- ♦ Please bring food for the serving line to the WEST door and bake sale items to the WEST DOUBLE GYM doors from **3:30-4:00 P.M.** An LCHS student will meet you to carry in food.
- ♦ **Moos** needs to be packed in a cooler with ice. A one-gallon drink pitcher works well.

Other Info:

- ♦ Tickets are sold at the south door and **everyone** except LCHS students buys one.
- ♦ Serving Line opens for 2nd shift workers at 4:30.
- ♦ BABYSITTING IS FOR WORKERS ONLY AND ONLY DURING THEIR SHIFT!
- ♦ Please report to your work shift **ON TIME** (refer to your job slip for your assignment)

Saturday Clean-up:

Clean-up will begin at **9:00 A.M. Saturday, March 26**. There will be lunch provided following clean-up! You are welcome to help Friday night after Schmeckfest, also.
