During the third week of March, the Lustre community had the privilege of hosting renowned speaker Brian Young, the brother of former principal of LCHS, Wes Young. Brian Young is the director of the Creation Instruction Association, an organization focused on preaching the Word of God not only for theological purposes but also for explaining scientific discoveries and the origins of the world. Over the course of the three days

that he was here, Brian covered lots of topics, ranging from the origins of earth, the dinosaurs, and even the lifespans of early humans.

On day one, Brian spoke heavily on the Creation of the Earth and how things came to be. Using passages such as II Corinthians 12:2 and Hebrews

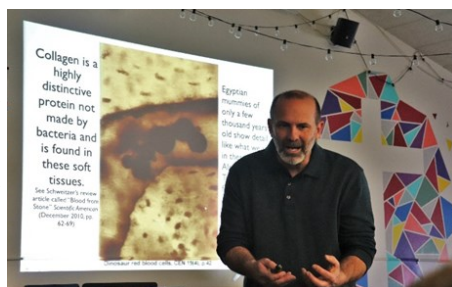
4:14, Brian introduced us to the interpretation of there being 3 “heavens.” First comes the sky, the realm of the birds and flying animals. The second heaven

refers to the celestial realm of outer space, including things such as the Sun, Moon, and stars. Last, and most

important of all is the Heaven of heavens, which is the heaven we typically associate with God. After establishing this concept, Brian showed us a few slides from his PowerPoint regarding the formation of land and sea, and the eventual separation of each into the continents we know today.

Brian suggested that the earth was fully formed in 6 days, as most Chris-

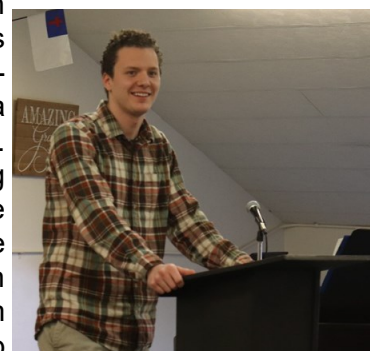

He ended up meeting several times with one of the pastors at the Evangelical Church in Glasgow. This led him to join the youth group there. He was 14 years

Last Wednesday, select students at Lustre Christian High participated in Academic Olympics in Glasgow. The team consisted of freshman student Rachel Pew, sophomore students Naveen Pilla and Cayden Klatt, as well as junior students Elijah Lenihan and Alex Chen. At the Academic Olympics, students took multiple tests in the fields of Math, Science, English, and Social Studies. The scores of all the students on a team were then compiled into

one total score that is compared against the other teams. Lustre placed 3rd among the schools there. Then, there was a trivia round, where students were each given a buzzer and asked questions. The first person to answer the question was awarded the point. Each round, two schools competed against each other in a single elimination, tournament style competition. Unfortunately, the LCHS team did not do very well in this affair, as

they were eliminated the first round.

There were also individual awards given out to the students for each test. Alex Chen placed 4th overall in the math category in a four-way tie. One of the students who tied with him was his classmate Elijah Lenihan, who also placed 4th in science, as well as 4th in social studies. Naveen Pilla placed 8th in math, and Rachel Pew was awarded the first-place ribbon among all the

freshman students attending, meaning she scored the highest on all the tests combined among the freshman group! All in all, it can be considered a successful outing for LCHS as the participants showcased their intellectual abilities.

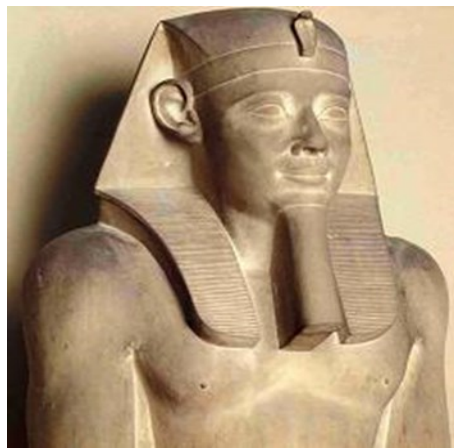

Pharaohs and the Bible By Arun Ramnarace

Brian Young, who was the speaker for Spiritual Emphasis Week at LCHS, graciously gave a presentation to the community on Tuesday, March 15. Brian Young travels around the country speaking to groups on topics related to Creation Science. As the director for Creation Instruction Association, this is his area of expertise.

On the evening of March 15, Mr. Young spoke about Egyptian pharaohs and their connection to Scripture. The man who was pharaoh of Egypt during Joseph's time was Sesostris. During his reign, he commissioned his slaves to build an obelisk on which they engraved in hieroglyphics an account of the 7 years of plenty and the 7 years of famine. This event is also recorded in the Bible. The obelisk also contained information about a man who was alive during this 14-year period named Mentuhotep who was Grand Visier of all Egypt. The Grand Visier

was a man who was second in command to the Pharaoh and could very well have been Joseph.

Then Mr. Young talked about how the Egyptians believed that when a person died their spirit left their body through their nose. As a result of this belief, some statues of "bad" pharaohs have their noses broken off to prevent their spirit from entering into the afterlife. We can see that Sesostris was loved by the people because his statue had his nose.

Finally, Mr. Young talked about how the Egyptian princess who rescued baby Moses from the Nile River could have possibly been called Sobekneferu. This name means "the beauties of Sobek the crocodile god." She prayed to Happy the god because she received a child.

I really enjoyed the talk that Mr. Young gave, and I am sure others benefited as well.

tians believe. He went on to explain that it did not rain before the flood, and that water came up from the Earth instead. (Gen. 2:5) Genesis 7:11 supports this rather unusual claim. It says that the "fountains of the deep" were "broken up" supporting Brian's position of waters coming from beneath the surface of the earth during the Flood.

On days two and three, Brian focused more on the lifespans of early humans, and the differences in the environment. He used recent

archaeological discoveries to disprove the evolutionary narrative and showed us a few magic tricks in the process as well. Brian Young showed us slight of hand tricks with coins, a Bible-themed coloring book that appeared to color itself in, and a Bible that shot flames out when the user flipped to the book of Revelation. His tricks entertained both young and old viewers. Because of the differences in the ozone layer, the earth's atmosphere was a lot more humid and it made it a lot easier for lifeforms to grow and prosper. Because of this,

plants and animals were a lot bigger than they are now and the fossil records show just that. Throughout history, we have seen the discovery of abnormally large plants and insects, like cattails, ferns, dragonflies, and mosquitoes. This oxygen-rich atmosphere also increased the healing rates and lifespans of humans, which is why we see people living hundreds of years in the older books of the Bible.

Brian Young didn't stop at speaking only at chapels, however. He took extra time to give discussions in Current Events,

Government, and numerous Bible classes. These discussions included talks on Islam, the Anti-Christ, shifts in politics in recent history, and more.

Brian Young is always a welcomed speaker at Lustre Christian, and we greatly appreciated him coming out and speaking this year! If you get a chance to attend one of his events, we highly recommend it. He'll give you an interesting new perspective that challenges the current narratives of our world. 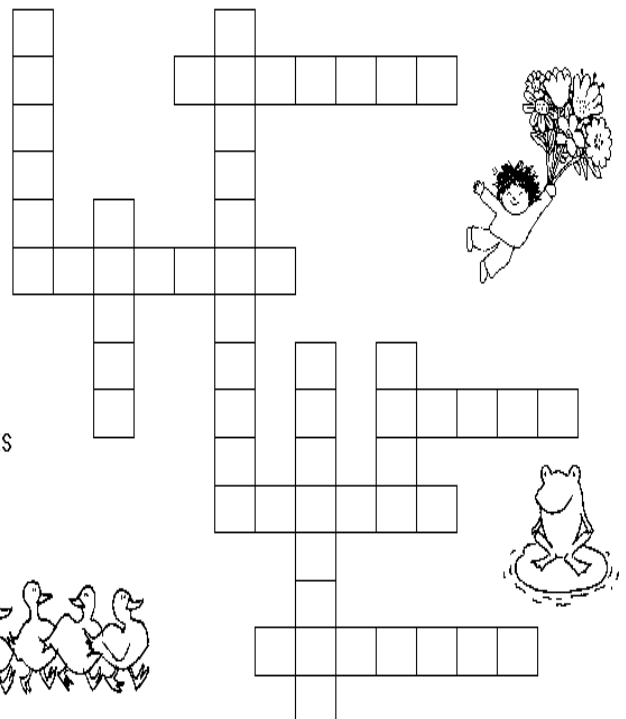

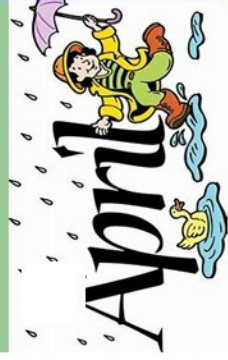
