

Proxy bidding will not be allowed during this portion of the auction.

The Online Auction will start on Thursday March 21st at 5:00pm and end Saturday, March 23rd. Items will END at staggering times starting at 5:00pm and ending at 7:00pm

If you are unable to watch the auction as much as you would like, you can enter a proxy bid for each item. A proxy bid allows you as the bidder to set a maximum price that you are willing to pay for an item, and then allows the computer system to bid for you by the bid increments until someone places a bid higher than your maximum.

If you place a bid in the last 60 seconds, the auction will be extended for another 30 seconds to allow bidding to continue.

All items are local pickup at LCHS on Sunday, March 24th at 12:30 PM unless other arrangements have been made.
