Different fall holidays around the world

Bon Om Touk Cambodia

Also known as the Cambodian Water Festival, Bon Om Touk is a three-day national holiday celebrated in late October or early November, often corresponding with the lunar Mid-Autumn Festival. It marks the end of the monsoon season and the reversal of the flow of the Tonlé Sap River, which flows from the Mekong River into the Tonlé Sap Lake during the rainy season, and then back into the Mekong River during the dry season.

Guy Fawkes Night United Kingdom

Bonfire Night, also known as Guy Fawkes Night, is a British celebration held on November 5th. It commemorates the failure of the Gunpowder Plot of 1605, when a group of Catholic conspirators attempted to blow up the Houses of Parliament and kill King James I. The Gunpowder Plot was foiled the night before it was due to take place and Guy Fawkes, one of the conspirators, was arrested in the cellar of Parliament where he was guarding the explosives. The other conspirators were either killed or captured, and all were eventually executed.

In the aftermath of the Gunpowder Plot, Parliament declared November 5th a national day of thanksgiving. Bonfires were lit all over the country, and effigies of Guy Fawkes were burned. The tradition of celebrating Bonfire Night has continued ever since!

Chuseok South Korea

Chuseok, also known as Hangawi, is a major midautumn harvest festival and a three-day holiday in Korea celebrated on the 15th day of the 8th month of the lunar calendar on the full moon. It is one of the most important holidays in South Korea, and is a time for families to come together and give thanks for the harvest and for their ancestors.

Feast of St. Martin Germany and France

The Feast of Saint Martin, also known as Martinmas, is a Christian feast celebrated on November 11th. It commemorates the death of Saint Martin of Tours, a 4th-century bishop who was known for his generosity and compassion.

Saint Martin is the patron saint of many different groups, including soldiers, beggars, tailors and winemakers. In many countries where the holiday is observed, such as France and Germany, people typically eat a goose dinner on Martinmas Eve or Martinmas Day — this tradition is thought to have originated because geese were slaughtered in the fall so that they could be preserved for the winter.

Ognissanti Italy

Ognissanti, also known as All Saint's Day, is a Christian holiday to honor and remember all of the saints, both known and unknown. Celebrated on November 1st each year, the holiday dates back to the early 8th century when it was established by Pope Gregory III.

Those who celebrate Ognissanti visit cemeteries to clean and decorate the graves of their loved ones, leaving flowers, food and drinks in honor of them.

Loy Krathong Lantern Festival - Thailand

This festival is celebrated throughout Thailand and in nearby countries including Laos, Kelantan and Kedah. The name roughly translates as 'to float ritual vessel or lamp' and comes from the main activity associated with the celebration. A krathong is a small floating basket, normally made of leaves and holding a small portion of some kind of traditional Thai dish, dessert, or a small coin.

These baskets are then floated on a river. Many Thai people use the krathong to thank Goddess Khongkha, the Goddess of Water and River. The festival takes place on the evening of the full moon of the 12th month in the traditional Thai lunar

calendar. This means that it normally falls in the month of November. In 2024 it will take place on 16 November.

Halloween: U.S., Canada, Scotland

Halloween has become global, though it's most widespread in the United States and Canada. Children dress up in costumes and go door-to-door "trick-ortreating." Families may place carved pumpkins, known as Jack-o'-Lanterns, out front. Children show off their costumes in exchange for some sweet treats.

On Halloween night in Scotland, this practice is known as "guising." Kids also perform jokes and short performances to earn their candy treats. Halloween dates back about 2,000 years to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain.

Origins also include Catholic traditions and religious services. Celebrants would light fires and dress up in scary attire to ward off ghosts on All Hallows Eve, the evening before All Souls' Day on November 1. Pope Gregory III designated this date as the Day of the Dead in the 8th century.

Thanksgiving: United States and Canada

Thanksgiving is celebrated in both Canada and the USA, with particular emphasis in the U.S. In Canada, Thanksgiving falls in October, and in the U.S., near the end of November.

The day calls for a feast. Traditionally, on holidays, families come together, even from a distance, so everyone is seated together around the table. A traditional Thanksgiving meal involves roasted turkey, cranberry sauce, sweet potatoes, and of course, a warm pumpkin pie—just to name a few items! Throughout U.S. history, many immigrants have added their own cultural traditions to the American Thanksgiving table, from rice with gravy to ube cheesecake and so much more.


