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Future Coders of Lustre

Lustre Grade School robotic teams participated in two events in the last 2 weeks. The first event was the regional qualifying rounds, held in Billings on the weekend of January 25th. We took two teams of 8 students, divided into the following teams: Lustre Lions 1, consisting of Justin Schiller, Nancy Schiller, Bryanna Allen, and Christiaan Nell. Lustre Lions A consisted of Liam Reyneke, Samuel Byers, Ian Unrau, and Josua without an H Matthyser. The teams headed down to Billings excited to qualify for the state tournament. This year's theme was Submerged, which was about saving the ocean.

The teams were judged on four core elements in the competition: Robot Game, Research, Robot Design, and Core Values. All categories are counted equally in the overall ranking. The day started with a judge's meeting, followed by each team presenting their research on

preserving the ocean and displaying their robot design to the judges. After the judge's meeting, it was time for the robot game. This consists of 3 rounds. There are three stations with two tables at each station. Two teams compete at each station per round. You get 2:30 min. to do as many missions as possible. Each mission has a specific set of scores. The students tend to go for missions with the highest scores and work their way down to the least high scores. In this qualifying tournament, both teams did exceptionally well. They took 1st (Lustre Lions A) & 2nd (Lustre Lions 1) place in the robot game. With them taking 1st and 2nd, both teams ended up qualifying for the state tournament. The State Tournament was scheduled for the weekend of February 8th in Bozeman. The teams departed on Thursday, February 6th. They arrived in Bozeman and attended a science night at the MSU Strand Union Building. The students got to explore some of the planets with a popup planetarium. The following day, they watched

the older kids' robotic games at the MSU Shroyer Gym. The students got the opportunity to walk through the pit lanes to see how the teams work on their robots and maybe get some ideas on building a robot that's not out of Lego. Just before lunchtime, we got some bad news. We were informed that the State Tournament had been canceled due to the bad weather. Almost half of the teams couldn't attend. This meant that the state tournament winner would be picked via a lottery draw. They took the two teams from each region and selected the winner through a

random draw. The option was still on the table for the teams that were in Bozeman to have a scrimmage round to test their skills. With this, our teams were still motivated to do their best. If the scores counted for State, the Lions 1 team would have won the Robot game, and Lustre A would have taken



6th place. However, because the tournament was canceled, they decided to take the scores from the qualifying rounds. This meant Lions A took 2nd place in their robotic game as they had the 2nd highest score among all the teams from Montana. When we were done with the tournament, the students had the opportunity to visit Station 2 at the Bozeman Fire Department. The students got to explore the building and the fire trucks and asked many questions. We want to thank the firefighters at Station 2, who were generous in accommodating the team. As coaches, we would like to thank the community for your support with the meals sold on Wednesday evenings and the bake sales. To the team, each of you guys and girls showed a lot of character during this season. You worked hard to get to where you wanted to be, and when the tournament was canceled, you guys still showed how amazing you were and gave your all. We are proud of you, and I'm sure everyone in the community is as well.

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The Evolution of Peer Pressure by Meredith Valentine

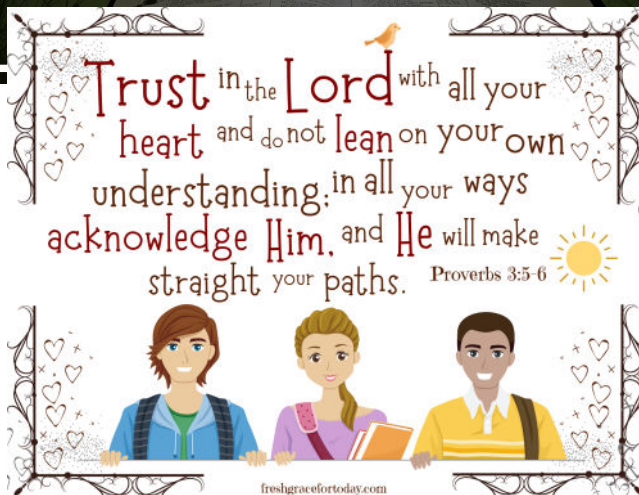
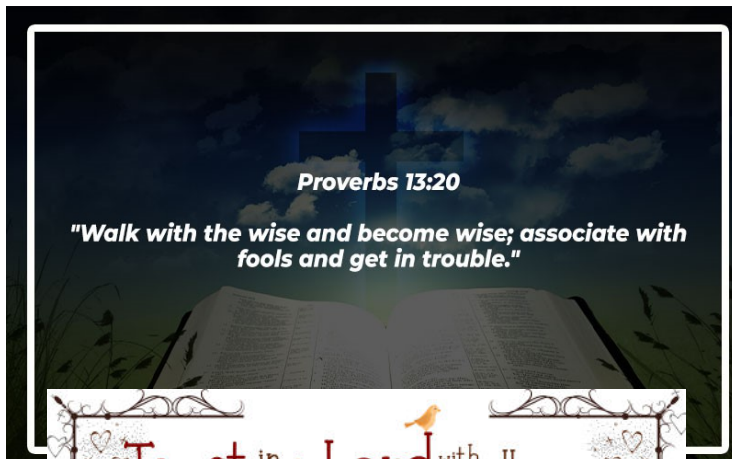
